David Katz, MD, is director and co-founder, Yale Prevention Research Center, and a medical consultant for ABC News. As the Colloquium addresses the question of "Are we there yet?" in seeking the Triple Aim, this presentation will raise the question of "Are we following the right map?"

As an authority on the prevention of chronic disease, nutrition and weight management, and a leader in integrative medicine and patient-centered care, Dr. Katz will address the power of lifestyle in redefining a person's health. The presentation will explain how by making lifestyle changes, U.S. citizens can potentially reduce the burden of chronic disease by 80 percent.

The critical role that the health care community can play in helping patients make the behavioral changes required for lifestyle change will be explained. Attendees will walk away with a renewed perspective and additional tools to get us "there."

A Sampling of Colloquium Sessions

Population Health/Care Delivery

- **Michael Parchman, MD**, will address Group Health Research Institute's adaptation of the LEAP team-based approach to meet the needs of a complex patient population.
- **Eric Anderson, MD**, and **Sandra Schellinger, RN**, will explain how Allina Health's LifeCourse program incorporates patient values/goals into the care of complex patients.
- **James Welters, MD**, will discuss Northwest Family Physicians' care delivery model, which won an award from Stanford as the nation's top care delivery clinic.
- **David Katzelnick, MD**, **Mark Williams, MD**, Mayo Clinic, and **Claire Neely, MD**, ICSI, will share lessons learned from the CMMI-funded COMPASS program to treat patients with both mental and medical conditions, and explain how Mayo is integrating the model into its adult care coordination.



Patient Care/Community Engagement

- **Joan Cleary**, Minnesota Community Health Workers Alliance, will describe its work to incorporate community health workers into teams focused on improving patient outcomes.
- **Sanne Magnan, MD, PhD**, ICSI, will moderate a discussion where organizations will share their experiences using the *Going Beyond Clinical Walls* materials, developed with support from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, to connect with resources in their communities.
- **Libby Hoy** will address the Patient & Family Centered Care Partners' work in California to engage communities to improve health from the family perspective, including the creation of a patient "passport" that addresses patients' values and goals.
- **Lyndee Knox, PhD**, LA Net, will describe how safety net clinics engage communities in quality improvement to reduce health disparities and improve clinical outcomes.



Cost and Leadership

- **Laurie Drill-Mellum, MD, PhD**, CMO, MMIC, will address clinician burnout, providing insights and information on efforts to address this ever-growing problem.
- **Albert Linderman, PhD**, Sagis Corporation, will explain the concept of "sense-making" and provide a hands-on practical approach for leaders to engage clinicians and employees in cultural transformation.
- **Henry Chung, MD**, will address the ongoing efforts at Montefiore Medical Center to meet the needs of high utilizers, and related cost containment efforts.
- **Tina Frontera** and **Gunnar Nelson** will describe the development and implementation of Total Cost of Care measures, observations since their launch, and their expected impact on Minnesota health care.
